
COALEY CALENDAR

NEWS FROM COALEY COMMUNITY SHOP

Planning permission for our temporary Portacabin premises comes to an end in two years time, so we are thinking hard about the future of the shop.

We believe it is useful to the village. Apart from being the only source of newspapers, our turnover (about £50,000) averages out at £65 worth of small purchases per year for every person in Coaley. This illustrates the extent of the local convenience and the number of longer journeys saved. The shop also offers a vital social hub where our customers meet and volunteers can help to develop the caring community spirit of the village.

Assuming we are going to continue in the longer term, we need a more permanent home. A purpose built bricks and mortar structure such as an extension to the village hall would be very expensive. A modular building, built in a factory and assembled on site could be better value for money. The aim would be a structure that improved rather than detracting from the village landscape.

Big decisions need to be made about planning, location, design, and fundraising. If anyone would like to join the project and help realise our future, please contact Brenda Board (860558 or 07986 348325) or leave your name in the shop.

RECREATION GROUND

Thanks to those dozen or so villagers who shared their ideas and concerns at the recreation ground forum in the Jubilee room on Tuesday 4th. The three thing main areas to recount from the drop-in session are:

1) Participants suggested various good ideas and approaches about about what to do and how:

Equipment suggestions included green gym equipment, a pump track, bike/board/scooter ramps, covered / multi-weather sandpit, BBQ space, seasonal variation / themes e.g. deck-chairs and mini-beach in the summer

Principles that came thought were to ensure facilities were 'inclusive' where possible (i.e can be used by all abilities and disabilities), creating more challenging options for our older children / teenagers, considering the needs of our pets, and creating a more attractive / less flat and featureless space

2) Participants identified a need to ensure that recreation plans and thinking was 'joined up' with the village hall, the shop and the play area in the close.

There was a need for a vision that we were all working towards.

For instance, a key question that came up was whether to retain, reduce, or lose the football pitch. If there is a desire to re-establish Coaley FC or

host competitive teams, then this would be an important constraint to our thinking. And hosting football teams depends on our ability to provide changing / showering facilities and this depends on the village hall plans / capacity. Or perhaps the new shop build. And if village football on a full sized pitch is a possibility we wish to retain for now, then any change to the recreation ground might need to be lighter / more reversible than it would be otherwise. In short, we need a shared vision with village buy-in so that we can plan accordingly.

It was suggested there could be a recreation space committee of some kind with representation from the parish council, the shop, the village and the close. If anyone is interested in getting involved in this please contact Lynn on clerk@coaleypc.org.uk.

3) We didn't hear enough from the younger generation.

Despite the school including the meeting in their newsletter, and the parish council publishing posters around the village and on the Facebook page, the mean, mode and median average age of the group was about 60! It may have been a tricky time for parents and families but feedback elsewhere was also minimal (one email from a parent and one Facebook comment).

The parish council have agreed to consult the school on how best to engage children and ensure we understand their needs.

The time has really flown by and all the hard work has been done. RECYCLING CENTRE CLOSURE

ROAD CLOSURE IN NYMPSFIELD

A blanket temporary traffic order has been made for resurfacing works on Bath Road and Crawley Hill, Nympsfield between the dates of 25th January 2019 and 31st March 2019.

This is a short section of the B4066 main road at the crossroads at the top of Frocester Hill and two sections of the road from that junction through Cockadilly. Maps are on the parish website.

The work is planned to take place from 12th February 2019 to 25th February 2019 on a rolling programme. Any date changes will be advertised by advance warning signs on site.
