The Covid-19 crisis is going to be challenging for everyone in the village. People who are having to self-isolate, either because they are ill or want to avoid getting ill, will need considerable help and support.

The most important thing people who are not self-isolating can do is to make sure their self-isolating friends and neighbours are OK and offer to help them with anything they require.

The parish council website at www.coaleypc.org.uk has a page dedicated to the crisis and is updated with the latest information that concerns the village. Please get in touch with the council if you have any content for that page.

If you are self-isolating you can register on the website to ask for help with tasks like shopping, collecting prescriptions or anything else. Even if you have no specific need we are happy just to give you a call every so often to make sure you're OK. On the other hand, if you're able to offer help then you can register for that. The council will match helpers with those that need it. We are concened to make sure the vulnerable are as safe as we can and have followed guidance to mutual aid organisations on setting up this sort of scheme.

If you don't have internet access then the best way of letting us know what you need is to get a relative or friend to register on-line for you - they don't need to live locally. Otherwise please ring one of the numbers in the panel below.

Coaley has an excellent community spirit and by working together we will deal with the situation we find ourselves in.

COALEY MAIN SEWER CAPACITY

Many of you who have lived in the village for a number of years will be aware that we suffer from occasional problems with the capacity of the main sewer which runs down "The Street" from the top of the village to West End and beyond. This sewer is probably more than 50 years old, and is what is known as a "combined sewer", that means that (as well as household effluent) it carries rainwater run-off. The rainwater component mainly comes from the gutters and drains of older houses (which discharge into the sewer rather than soak-aways), but may also carry overflow from storm drains or incursion of ground water into the older clay pipes which carry the effluent.

Periodically periods of heavy or persistent rain cause the main sewer to overflow onto the highway, and you will see water coming out of the triangular drain covers particularly around the road by the school. In addition a number of properties can suffer from drains "backing up" causing difficulty in clearing water away from their own drains, or discharge through external drains or inspection pits.

This winter has seen repeated episodes of these problems and residents, supported by Councillor Jim Dewey and the Parish Council, have been engaged in discussions with Severn Trent and Stroud District Council as to what can be done to reduce or control this. Our concern is that changing climate, and the growth

in the numbers of houses attached to the drain over the last 10-20 years, is making this a much more common problem for the village.

The SDC Water Resources Officer's assessment was that "There is a general capacity issue affecting the present (Coaley) public sewer network which appears insufficient to now address the increased demand from the surrounding locality, not just the feed into the network of drainage from the Betworthy Farm development. Whether this is as a result of accumulating changes to the surrounding locality or the presently experienced climate conditions is for further investigation"

In discussion with their engineer Severn Trent accept that their pumping station by the Rail Bridge (which clears this sewer into the main system) has suffered periodic over-load. However they say that they have had insufficient evidence of problems in Coaley to take substantial action at this point. It was pointed out to them that reporting the problem normally results in a visit by a maintenance team days after the event, who then report the drain is flowing freely, and that this may be discouraging residents from making problem reports.

So, in order to build a case for action by Severn Trent, the Parish Council would like to encourage all residents who experience problems or notice the main sewer overflowing to report this. This has been endorsed by Severn Trent who stated that they would rather



know about the problems, even if they cannot do much in the short term.

So, if you see the main sewer overflowing onto the highway, or you have any problems with your own drains backing-up, please report this to Severn Trent by one of the methods below:

It would also help if you let the Parish Council know. We are now hopefully getting to drier weather in the spring, but please continue to monitor this problem through the rest of the year so we can get an idea of the frequency of this issue.

Solar panels/feasibility study for community building

There were many other excellent suggestions by residents including many initiatives to reduce food packaging by buying bulk, start repair cafes and plant trees in the local area. We've logged all the requests for local projects and we are aiming to work on these in the future.






