### HUMPTY DUMPTY AND THE MAGIC WALL

Welcome back to the Coaley
Pantomime! Last year's enforced break
certainly didn't appear to have affected
the cast's confidence and sense of fun.
Everyone on stage, in this colourful and
joke-laden show, was obviously having
a great time and clearly relishing being
able to perform Coaley's unique brand
of pantomime humour in front of
appreciative audiences, once again.

Coaley Art Group had put a great deal of work into creating the faraway kingdom of Eggstonia and the first sight to greet visitors was the extremely



colourful Nutcracker Soldiers adorning the proscenium arch around the stage. The "Magic Wall" in the title was home to a huge eggshell, which served as a prison for the rotten egg, Humpty Dumpty, (gamely portrayed by Simon Ellis in a bright and suitably eggshaped costume). Powerful



enchantments had kept him trapped inside the eggshell since he and his boss, the evil witch Salmonella, (played by panto regular, but first-time "baddy", Gemma Sirett) had failed to overthrow the King. The nursery rhyme says that "Humpty Dumpty had a great fall" and it was Salmonella's plan to return from exile and free her wicked accomplice. so they could once again try to steal the royal crown. With the help of an evil spell and the ingenious engineering of chief prop maker, Dave Prout, the egg did indeed fall from the wall and so the scene was set for the battle to save the crown. King Eggbert enlisted the help of his army to try to repair the eggshell so humpty could be transported back inside, thus restoring normality to his usually peaceful kingdom. Normality, however, is always non-existent in pantomime and a variety of eccentric and hilarious characters helped to

move the story along at a lively pace.

The talents within this group are EGGSemplary and the whole cast and crew worked EGGStremely well together to provide a polished performance. The show would not be a pantomime without a Dame and this year Keri James, as Minnie Meringue, joined forces with Paul Day, as Charlie Chuck, the royal chamberlain, to provide lots of quick-fire humour. Special mention should be given to the younger members of the cast for their confident performances; in particular, Emily Smith, who portrayed the hero, Prince Benedict, with panache and attitude. Mia Coggins, playing Queen Omelette, gave 100% effort to her characterisation and was obviously enjoying the show as much as the audiences were! The youngest members of the cast also got to shine,





with a remarkable degree of energy and confidence. A scene-stealing turn from Bella Bywater, as Flora the kitchen maid, had the whole hall in stitches, although most of her hilarious performance took place offstage! All too soon the finale arrived, seeing Humpty back inside his shell, with Salmonella for company, having been banished with a blood-curdling scream. Of course, a happy ending is obligatory and this lively show ended with Princess Shelley (a suitably regal Bea Smith) marrying her Prince.

The songs, as always, were toetapping and delivered with enthusiasm and fun. Many congratulations to everyone concerned with this year's production. EGGceptional stuff!!

# COME AND JOIN THE DURSLEY MALE VOICE CHOIR

Choral singing is good for your health. If you've been to see Dursley Male Voice Choir in recent years you might have noted how regular singing in a choir can see you through to a ripe old age! Indeed, it has been scientifically proven that choral singing is good for both your physical and mental health.

Dursley Male Voice Choir was founded by a group of enthusiastic local singers in 1978 and has since grown to be one of the principal male voice choirs of the region with singers drawn from communities around Dursley and the wider Stroud district.

The Choir performs around 12 concerts each year, the majority of them for charity. As well as local concerts the choir performs at many venues around

the UK and internationally. Memorable concerts include those whilst on tour in south-west Ireland, at St George's Hall in Bristol in aid of Southmead Hospital, as well as concerts in the Pittville Pump Rooms, Colston Hall, Gloucester Cathedral, Bath Abbey and Cheltenham Town Hall. The choir toured Yorkshire in September 2017 singing at Harrogate and in Ripon Cathedral. Then again in 2019 singing near Sheffield and in Wakefield Cathedral. Over the years the choir has been successful in many competitions and have toured extensively including Canada, Austria, Ireland as well as many UK locations.

The choir has recently resumed performances following 18 months of COVID enforced absence. This period has also seen a number of our older members decide that the time has come for them to retire from the choir. They will be missed, but this has also



galvanised a recruitment campaign to bring the choir up to its former strength.

So, to the gentlemen among you, or ladies who think their men would benefit from a bit of choral singing, we would like to welcome you into the Dursley Male Voice Choir. Yes, you do need to be able to hold a tune, but we're not looking for a Pavarotti or the next Bryn Terfel. You don't need to be able to read music; in fact, we provide practice tracks and videos to help you learn pieces at home. We are also making special efforts to help support new members. So, as well as ensuring you have a 'buddy' in your early weeks we will also offer 'New Members' practices to help you come up to speed with pieces the choir already knows well. We practice on a Wednesday from 7.30 to 9.30pm at the Chantry Centre in Dursley.

#### NURTURE NATURE

Hedgerow Wildlife Decline

The hedgerow network is our largest nature reserve. 130 species of our living wildlife are associated with hedgerows including Hedgehog, Hazel Dormouse, Brown Hairstreak Butterfly and many bird species. Planting more hedgerows will help the climate too, as a significant amount of carbon sequestration is attributable to hedgerows according to the ORE (Organic Research Centre). This is the time of year to bulk up your existing hedges and plant new ones. If you've put up a fence recently, plant a suitable hedge alongside it with suitable species to help garden birds, and bats too.

Where have all the birds gone? Currently there appears to be a crash in some populations of our iconic birds, e.g. Blackbirds and robins are not singing to guard their territories as they normally do in autumn. Why? Probably because there aren't sufficient birds for territories, so they don't have to - due to lack of competition. Should others have alternative explanations, please let us know through the village magazine etc.

Look out now for wintering migrants, such as Redwings (right) and Fieldfares from Scandinavia. Leave windfall apples on the ground for them and even put out ageing fruit from your fruit bowl.



# TWELVE IDEAS FOR A MORE SUSTAINABLE CHRISTMAS

- 1. Xmas card list trimming! Verbally greeting the people you see with the spirit of the season instead of a card can reduce your list. For those you do send, charity cards and FSC or PEFC certified cards are a positive move. Another option is to send an e-card.
- 2. 'Brown paper packages tied up with string' ... can be just as exciting, especially when given the personally decorated touch, perhaps with natural materials for example pine cones or seed heads. Recycled wrapping paper is a good choice too, avoiding glitter and other additions made of plastic which are non-recyclable. Try paper tape instead of plastic sellotape or cleverly fold paper and tie with string or raffia (not ribbon which is usually plastic). Imaginative wrapping using left over fabric can be eye catching, and kept for future use.
- 3. Christmas cards from previous years can be made into gift tags and decorate presents too.
- 4. Shopping locally to support local businesses, and avoiding multi-national companies and imported products with high carbon footprints are thoughtful moves.
- 5. Supporting the circular economy by buying secondhand gifts is not only kind to the planet but usually the pocket too! Toys, books and clothes for example can be found in charity shops

- or online sites such as 'World of Books', 'Vinted', 'Preloved' and of course eBay.
- 6. Giving consumable gifts is very often appreciated as many of us have too many 'things'. Have fun choosing treats such as cheeses, specialty foods, a Xmas cake, nuts, preserves or soaps, Homemade treats have a special value.
- 7. Maybe think of the gift of time together a shared lunch, visit or an experience. This can be a great alternative to toys for children.
- 8. Considering a charity donation for 'the person who has everything' can be win win!
- 9. Choosing a Christmas tree grown in Britain lessens 'tree miles' and discourages imported pests and diseases; recycling for shredding afterwards is eco-friendly. The local charity Longfield (01453 886868) collects trees for shredding for a donation, so is well worth supporting.
- 10. Careful planning can help to avoid over buying food for the festive season but if you have excess, the Olio app connects neighbours with each other, and local businesses, for sharing of food, and other items, to prevent waste.
- 11. Christmas dinner is feast time! Local, ethically reared, organic or free range meat is a conscientious choice. For a plant based option there are some tasty recipes that live up to the



special occasion.

12. Eco – friendly crackers are a snappy idea! Good examples have plastic free gifts, and packaging in recycled paper from a sustainable source, for example those from the RSPB. Homemade crackers are fun to make and fill and a great activity with children. Use old wrapping paper and cardboard rolls, devise jokes and make tiny gifts (eg homemade tree decorations, or home cooked treats).
